### **FATHER'S FOCUS**

### Saint Clare of assisi

It has been said that Ignatius of Loyola learned his rules of discernment by comparing worldly reading to reading the lives of the saints.

"When Ignatius reflected on worldly thoughts, he felt intense pleasure; but when he gave them up out of weariness, he felt dry and depressed. Yet when he thought of living the rigorous sort of life he knew the saints had lived, he not only experienced pleasure when he actually thought about it, but even after he dismissed these thoughts, he still experienced great joy."

I called this to mind as I finished a book titled: Saint Clare of Assisi: Light From the Cloister by Bret Thoman, OFS. To be honest, I often watch the news, or old movies, or football; but I don't, as often, read the lives of the Saints. But after I read this book, I found myself realizing, again, what St. Ignatius himself had already learned: I may enjoy the distraction of the TV, but I am spiritually fed when I read books like this one on Clare. As soon as I finished reading, I preached on it the next day at a school Mass and on the following Sunday as well.

So, I asked myself, "Jarrod, why don't you read the lives of the saints more often?" Good question. So, I want to encourage you to read the lives of the saints with me, too.



As for this book, Clare was such a cool saint! Born in 1194, Clare was thirteen years younger than St. Francis. This means that, as a young girl, she would have witnessed St. Francis' conversion from start to finish. Having seen the remarkable things God did in St. Francis' life, she began to pray for Francis and yearned to live a life of poverty as well. At age sixteen she met St. Francis, and he began to secretly instruct her on the Spiritual life. In her Francis came to see the first woman to embrace the life of poverty to which God called him.


But like St. Francis, she was from a family of nobility, and, also like Francis, her parents would not approve of her life of celibacy and poverty. For this reason, on May 9th, 1212, at the age of 18, Clare snuck out of her parents' house at night, went outside the city walls of Assisi down to the Church of San Damiano—the same Church where St. Francis heard Jesus speak to him from the cross.

There, on that night, in that Church, St. Clare received her vows and cut off her hair as a sign of her consecration. Then, covering her head with a veil and putting on new clothes, she hid for weeks in a protected monastery so that her parents couldn't drag her back home.

Soon after, when she knew her parents understood her call, she moved back to San Damiano, where she lived the rest of her life dedicated to God in prayer, fasting, service, and poverty. There, in her convent, Clare welcome dozens of women into her order, from which many other convents grew. She had to defend the charism of poverty from bishops and popes of the time, only receiving full permission for her way of life on the day of her death—Aug 11, 1253.

Before that, she lived quite the life. She withstood a band of marauding Saracens intent on sacking her convent by worshipping the Lord in the Eucharist in the front entrance. Her piety and tenacity confused the Saracens and the army fled in dismay. She received the dead body of St. Francis the day after he passed to offer prayers and supplications on his behalf. Upon her death, Clare was immediately declared a Saint and buried in Assisi in her own Church (just like St. Francis) where she can be visited to this day.

I strongly encourage you to read this book. And maybe you will learn the same lesson I hope to take to heart: reading the lives of the saints is more fulfilling than watching TV.

1<sup>ST</sup> & 7<sup>TH</sup> GRADER PARENT MEETINGS

There are very different understandings of just what *The Stewardship Way of Life* means amongst our parish family. In an effort to provide common understanding, I have started conducting several evening meetings with a focused group of parents. These meetings start with a 20-minute presentation and end with an open forum for questions and discussion lasting from 30 – 60 minutes. I pray that the Holy Spirit has given the attendees a sense of value. These meetings will expand to the entire parish, over time.

In preparation for these meetings, I have received many questions. Let me try and address this from a broad perspective: There are two words that pop into my head concerning stewardship. Those two words are **gratitude** and **love**. Gratitude for ALL that we have and are, and Love because without God's love we would never have existed. God doesn't need us, yet how desperately we need him. I am humbled when I reflect on the fact that God loved us into existence, and if any point He even for second ignored us, we would cease to exist. These are eye opening understandings

about how insignificant we are compared to our Lord and how we must be grateful and thankful for his love, that has made and given us everything. As we understand this and progress on our journey towards salvation we will start emulating more of God's qualities and less of man's qualities God's qualities are Love. We will grow in our understanding of love of God and neighbor; this is the backbone of The Stewardship Way of Life.

This is why I am inviting all 1st and 7th grade parents to the meetings. I will not judge if someone should or shouldn't come. I never used the word mandatory for the meeting although I want everyone to be there and receive a common understanding. I want them to come out of gratitude rather than fear of reprisal. I love group meetings versus individual meetings; everyone benefits from the discussion and questions. These meetings are not so much about you but your relationship to God.

Stay tuned, there are more meetings scheduled soon.





### THE PRINCIPLE OF DOUBLE EFFECT

Life doesn't always follow an easy script. In fact, quite often, there are decisions in life when it becomes both necessary and prudent to seek out knowledgeable advice from those who are familiar with the church's teaching on moral issues. One of the most interesting of these moral philosophies is the "principle of double effect", which was articulated by the great Catholic theologian St. Thomas Aquinas, who used it to show that killing in self-defense is justified (Summa Theologiae I-II q64 art. 7).

This principle seeks to add clarity and framework to evaluating whether certain actions are permissible when they produce both desired and undesired consequences. The following are the four necessary conditions which EACH must be satisfied. If the case does not pass all four criteria, it is not permissible.

### 1. The moral object (action) must be good or neutral in itself and not intrinsically evil.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church (1755) says "A morally good act requires the goodness of the object, of the end, and of the circumstances together. An evil end [motive] corrupts the action, even if the object is good in itself (such as praying and fasting "in order to be seen by men"). There are some concrete acts - such as fornication (sex outside of marriage)-that it is always wrong to choose, because choosing them entails a disorder of the will, that is, a moral evil."

## 2. The evil result is tolerated, not intended; the good effect is what the agent intends. The agent must have the right intention. (The good must be willed and the evil merely tolerated)

Catechism of the Catholic Church (1737) says "An effect can be tolerated without being willed by its agent; for instance, a mother's exhaustion from tending her sick child. A bad effect is not imputable if it was not willed either as an end or as a means of an action, e.g., a death a person incurs in aiding someone in danger. For a bad effect to be imputable it must be foreseeable and the agent must have the possibility of avoiding it, as in the case of manslaughter caused by a drunken driver."

# 3. The good effect doesn't occur as a result of the evil effect. You can't do an evil to achieve the good; the ends don't justify the means. The good effect must be the direct result of the action taken. The evil effect stems indirectly from the act,

while the good effect stems directly from it. (The good effect must not come about as a result of the evil effect, but must come directly from the action itself).

### 4. There must be a proportionate reason for doing the act, or the good effect must balance the evil effect.

Among these reasons must be the unavailability of other alternatives. (The good effect must be at least equivalent to importance to the evil effect).

**Example A:** A young woman is expecting a child when she is diagnosed with uterine cancer. The cancer is advanced, and without an immediate hysterectomy (removal of the uterus), the expectant mother will die. How is this permissible? A few things to consider:

- 1. Removal of a diseased organ is a good.
- 2. The intention is to save the mother's life.
- 3. Saving the mother's life is not caused by the death of the baby but by the removal of the uterus.
- 4. The death of the baby is balanced by the life of the mother.

**Example B**: Carpet bombing in World War II, in which pilots dropped bombs indiscriminately on a city as a scare tactic.

- 1. Dropping bombs on innocent people is intrinsically evil.
- 2. We can assume they intend good despite the evil (death is intended).
- 3. The good effect comes about as a direct result of the evil effect
- 4. The balance is not proportionate.


**Example C:** The parents of Karen Anne Quinlan, who was in a coma, wanted to remove her respirator. Here, the good effect is the placing of a life into nature's or God's hands. The extraordinary means of keeping the person breathing are burdensome and may well be preventing the person's natural time of death. The bad effect is the death itself.


- 1. The act of removing extraordinary treatment is neutral.
- 2. The parents intend the good effect and tolerate or allow the death.
- 3. The death is not caused by the removal of the treatment, but by the body's natural inability to breathe.
- 4. Given the burdensomeness of 'forcing' life onto someone whose time to die has likely come, the means are proportionate.






