



COVID FLOWCHART FOR STUDENTS

For COVID-19, **Close contact** includes living in the same household of an infected person, being within 6 feet of infected person for at least 10 continuous minutes, or being in direct contact with secretions from the infected person.

Student reports they are **positive for COVID-19.**

Student has a fever of 100.4 F or higher or has **more than one symptom BEFORE** entry to building.

Student reports **experiencing one or more symptoms of COVID-19** while during the school day.

Student reports **someone at home has symptoms OR someone at home has tested positive.**

Student reports **someone in their home was exposed to someone who tested positive or has symptoms.**

Parent notifies the school and the student remains home for a minimum of 10 days from date of positive test result. Siblings are quarantined.

Student may not enter the building. Student/Parent should contact their primary care physician for guidance on whether testing is required.

Student is sent home or moved to the isolation room until parents can pick them up and ...

Student cannot enter the building. There is no need to notify staff or students regarding this scenario.

If the someone at home is not symptomatic, but just 'exposed,' student may come to school

There is no need to self-isolate or notify any staff or students.

Student should self-isolate at home for 10 days from positive test if he/she has no symptoms or 14 days from symptom onset with at least 72 hours of no fever without fever reducing medication and improved symptoms. If student was in isolation, siblings remain home for 14 days from date of last exposure.

Student may return to school when the student is symptom free and at least 72 hours have passed with no fever, without the use of fever-reducing medication.

The student may return after receiving a negative COVID test result or has been diagnosed by a doctor with a different cause of illness..

If the student was on campus in the last 48 hours ...

- Current known symptoms:
- Fever (100.4 or higher)
 - Chills
 - Rigors
 - Muscles and body aches
 - Fatigue
 - Headache
 - Sore throat
 - Lower Respiratory illness (cough, breath shortness)
 - New loss of taste or smell
 - Diarrhea
 - Nausea/Vomiting

Student should contact their primary care physician for guidance on testing

If symptomatic family member tests negative and the student has no symptoms, the student may return.

If family member tests positive, the student remains home for 14 days from the date of last exposure.

The School will notify Dr. Jamie Finkeldei at the Catholic School Office and together they will contact the local health department for guidance.

Teacher identifies any other student or staff who have been exposed (within 6 feet for at least 10 minutes) on the previous two days the student who tested positive was present. Teacher will report those persons to the principal.

The school will work with the local health department to send written notification of possible exposure to all staff and parent/guardian of students who were exposed.

All student and staff who were exposed will be excluded from school for 14 days from date of last exposure. Those persons will need to monitor their symptoms at home and contact their primary care provider if they develop.
